SUPREME CHAPLAIN'S MESSAGE

Deacon Frank is taking a break so our Supreme Chaplain is pinch-hitting for him

In a world often overshadowed by sin, the presence of Christ remains our true hope and guiding light



WE HAVE TURNED the corner. The shortest, darkest days of the year are slowly growing longer and lighter. Yet, in the cold of a winter's night, it may be hard to envision the warmth and light of spring.

It was amid darkness that the Savior was born. At first, the darkness of the crude stable where the incarnate Son of God entered the world was punctuated only by the flickering lights of candles and torches. Yet Jesus was born not merely in the dark of night but also amid the dark night of humanity's sinful state. Despite God's signs and messages spoken through prophets and kings, darkness seemed to reign over the good earth God had made.

Was there any hope that the flickering lights in a rough Bethlehem stable could even be seen in the darkness, let alone overcome it? Was there any chance that the Child in the manger, born into the poorest of circumstances, was in fact "the light of the world" (Jn 8:12)? As the story of Jesus' birth unfolded, the night sky was brightly lit not only with stars but also with angels reflecting the beauty and brightness of the One who is "God from God and light from light." And over this stable hovered a star, brighter than the rest, the star of the Epiphany, by which the greatness of the little Child was first revealed to the nations.

“The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it” (Jn 1:5).

As the year 2019 dawns upon us, we may feel that darkness still reigns over the world. Looking about, we see under cover of darkness a brutal disregard in society for the sacredness of human life — especially the lives of unborn children, the frail elderly and the chronically ill. We see amid the darkness many people living at the point of a sword for the faith that they profess. We see the sorry plight of immigrants and refugees. We live in a culture perpetually outraged, increasingly polarized, tragically plagued by violence. We see the darkness of sin in our Church, with the appalling abuse of children by some of its own leaders. We look with gloom as many, especially the young, forsake the light of faith for the false promises of a godless secularity. We also sense the darkness of sin lurking in our hearts and homes. We find how easily we prefer this darkness to the light of grace. Still, “The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.”

Could it be that even in our times the flickering light in the Bethlehem stable might still shine forth? The light of the Epiphany star heralded a light that would never fade. The light of heaven itself shone forth as the Holy Spirit descended upon Jesus during his baptism in the Jordan. Jesus, “the light of the world,” would manifest his Father’s glory in the power of the Spirit as he preached the Good News, healed the sick, expelled demons and cured the sick. “I have come to set the earth on fire,” Jesus said, “and how I wish it were blazing” (Lk 12:49).

Our Savior ignited this fire upon the Cross, in the glory of his Resurrection and in his commission to the Apostles to spread the Gospel. And he ignited it, too, in our hearts on the day we were baptized “with fire and the Holy Spirit” (Mt 3:11). We should frequently ask ourselves: Is it still burning brightly? It does no good to bemoan the state of the world. Rather, the light of faith and zeal for the Gospel must burn in our hearts. Knights, like missionaries of old, are called to go and set the world on fire by charity, unity and fraternity.

Supreme Council News

WASHINGTON — Supreme Knight Carl Anderson stood before the throngs of people assembled on the mall in Washington D.C. for this year's 46th national March for Life and delivered a message four decades in the making.

"Some of us have been coming back for more than 40 years now," he said. "But the really great news is that you, the pro-life generation, aren't going to wait that long! You won't have to wait that long to win justice for the unborn and compassionate care for their mothers.

"Why? Because of the progress we've made in rebuilding a culture of life."

One example of this progress is the fact the Knights of Columbus recently placed its 1,000th ultrasound in a crisis pregnancy center. Ultrasounds are a proven way of reducing abortion because many



women opt to keep their babies when they see the fetus on the ultrasound.

The Knights, meanwhile, proudly displayed their commitment at the march as well. There, tens of thousands of Knights of Columbus "Love Life, Choose Life" signs were among the sea of signs and banners, and interspersed in the crowd were hundreds of K of C hats and ear warmers, helping ward off the cold in the snow-covered capital. The Friday, Jan. 18 event began with a rally sponsored by the March for Life Education and Defense Fund under the theme "unique from day one." Supreme Knight Anderson spoke at the rally shortly after the airing of a video thanking the Knights of Columbus for their funding of 1,000 life-saving ultrasound machines.

Citing a recent Marist Poll commissioned by the Knights of Columbus in 2018, he said that 3 out of 4 Americans want substantial restrictions on abortion.

"That's 9 out of 10 Republicans, almost 8 out of 10 Independents and 6 out of 10 Democrats," the supreme knight said. "Standing for life is not radical. Overturning abortion is the majority position."

This majority position is a sign that *Roe v. Wade* will be reversed, he explained.

"I promise you this: The day is not far off when you will return, not for a demonstration, but for a victory parade down Pennsylvania Ave.! Together on that day we will celebrate the victory for faith

and science — for both compassionate care and common sense.”

In a surprise appearance, Vice President Mike Pence and his wife, Karen, also addressed the rally. “We gather because we stand for life. We gather because we stand for compassion,” the vice president said. “From the White House to your house, life is winning in America once again.” Pence’s remarks were followed by a video message from President Donald Trump, who affirmed that “every life has meaning and every life is worth defending” and that “every child is a sacred gift from God.”

The message that every life has meaning is central to the March for Life, which can be traced to grassroots efforts in the 1970’s. Two years before her death, March for Life Founder Nellie Gray remembered the K of C involvement in these grassroots efforts, saying, “I received a call from [some] Knights of Columbus. I didn’t even know who they were, but they explained their stance against abortion and needed a place to meet to discuss plans for a march. That place was my living room.”

Eileen Vogel of Women Concerned for the Unborn Child in Pennsylvania was in Gray’s living room during that meeting with Knights.

“I remember saying that it didn’t matter how many people showed up,” Vogel said. “If there were only 10 of us, history would have to record that there was a voice of protest against the killing of innocent babies.”

As evidenced by this year’s marching crowd, the peaceful voice of protest is still strong, even after 46 years. After the rally, said to be the largest to date in the march’s 40 year history, the crowd grew in size, reaching hundreds of thousands, according to EWTN reporters at the event.

The Knights of Columbus have been at the forefront of March for Life since the first march in 1974. Knights put their pro-life beliefs into action with countless other pro-life programs, including the Ultrasound Initiative, Pregnancy Center Support, Special Olympics, Masses for People with Special

Needs and so much more. Each shows the world that every person deserves the chance to be loved, to be welcomed and to live to his or her full potential.

In closing, Supreme Knight Anderson challenged the crowd to keep working to end abortion. “When you get back home,” he said, “get to it. “Oh, one more thing. You guys – how about joining the Knights?”

So Who Was He?

Saint Valentine, officially **Saint Valentine of Terni**, is a widely recognized 3rd-century Roman saint commemorated on February 14 and since the High Middle Ages is associated with a tradition of courtly love.

All that is reliably known of the saint commemorated on February 14 is his name and that he was martyred and buried at a cemetery on the Via Flaminia close to the Ponte Milvio to the north of Rome on that day. It is uncertain whether St. Valentine is to be identified as one saint or the conflation of two saints of the same name. Several different martyrologies have been added to later hagiographies that are unreliable.

The Roman Catholic Church continues to recognize him as a saint, listing him as such in the February 14 entry in the Roman Martyrology, and authorizing liturgical veneration of him on February 14 in any place where that day is not devoted to some other obligatory celebration in accordance with the rule that on such a day the Mass may be that of any saint listed in the Martyrology for that day.

Saint Valentine is commemorated in the Anglican Communion, as well as in Lutheranism. By some of the Eastern Orthodox Church, Saint Valentine the Presbyter of Rome is celebrated on July 6 and Hieromartyr Valentine (Bishop of Interamna, Terni in Italy) is celebrated on July 30.
